

## SEGOVIA Ayllón





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The Medieval town of Ayllón has been officially recognised as a national complex of historical and artistic monuments since 1973. The town, which is of great architectural and cultural richness is located in the north-east of the province of Segovia. The district shares borders with Soria and Guadalajara and is close to that of the province of Burgos. It is 135 km from both Madrid and Burgos and 95 km from Soria and the provincial capital, Segovia. It is 120 km from Guadalajara.

It is only 30 km away from the Madrid-Burgos motorway (A-I). At the foot of the Sistema Central (central system of mountain ranges), known as the Ayllón mountain range.

## GENERAL INTRODUCTION, GEOGRAPHY AND HISTORY



## HISTORY

The Celtiberians were the first recorded settlers of Ayllón, known owing to an abundance of remains which were uncovered in the mound from which today the torre de La Martina (La Martina tower) rises. After came the Goths, the Visigoths and the Moors. Kings Alfonso VI, Alfonso VII, Fernando III, Fernando IV have passed through the town as well as, María de Molina and el Cid Campeador, saints such as St. Francis of Asisi to whom the foundation of the St. Francis convent is attributed. St. Vincent Ferrer or St. Teresa of Jesus. Juan II conceded the Lordship of the town of Ayllón to Don Álvaro de Luna, who in 1423 would be named Constable of Castille. a festival which is celebrated in the town on the last Saturday in July.

#### The bridge and the archway

After crossing the Romanesque bridge which spans the river Aguisejo the archway looms ahead, one of the three town gates. It is the main entrance on which rest four coats of arms belonging to the four most distinguished families in Ayllón. After passing through the Medie-



val gate to enter the town, we can see on our right the majestic façade of the Palacio de los Contreras. Juan de Contreras ordered its construction in 1497 and the façade is decorated with a Franciscan cord motif and three sloping coats of arms, something quite unusual, although the coffering on the interior suggests that certain parts of the building are earlier than this date.

#### Main square

Having passed the Contreras Palace, we find ourselves before the majestic porticoed square with colonnades extending from the the town hall, the first palace of the Marquises of Villena, situated to the right of the magical Romanesque church of San Miguel. From the square the Martina tower can be seen at the top of the mound which presides over the town and the belfry of the church of Santa María la Mayor. In the centre of the square is the fountain of four spouts, which has witnessed the history and advancement of the town and its customs. It was built to commemorate the 4th centenary of the discovery of America in 1892.

### Church of San Miguel

To enter the church of Miguel is to bathe in silence, serenity, magic and beauty. The oldest remains date back to the 12th century, although additions and modifications were






made until the 18th century. The mix of architectural styles from different centuries is wellbalanced, lending it a particular charm. The residence of the parish priest was here until 1993, the year in which its principal restoration work was carried out, after which the building was left in its current state. It is precisely in this unequalled spot where the tourist office is located in the summer months to provide the visitor with information about the town and its surroundings. It is also used for exhibitions, concerts, theatre and many other cultural and artistic events.

The half-hidden façade, displays an arch decorated with rosettes, zig-zags and the chequerboard pattern.






The circular apse, has some capitals decorated with vegetable motifs and corbels which support a braided cornice. The church of San Miguel houses the tomb of Pedro Gutiérrez de César, treasurer and secretary to Diego I López Pacheco, and that of his second wife Juana Enríquez, the marquises of Villena. The tomb was originally located in the church of San Juan, in a lavish Gothic chapel dedicated to St. Sebastian and for the purpose of housing the remains of the aforementioned family. The Gothic script on the tomb reads: "Aquí yacen sepultados los muy nobles señores el tesorero Pedro Gutiérrez y María Álvarez de Vallejo, su mujer, que fue natural de Escalona, fundadores y dotadores de esta capilla. Falleció el tesorero año de 1531..." (Here lie entombed the very noble treasurer Pedro Gutiérrez and María Álvarez de Vallejo, his wife, born in Escalona, founders and benefactors of this chapel. The treasurer died in 1531...).

#### Church of Santa María la Mayor

Where this church now stands there was once a parish church whose dilapidated apse collapsed in the early hours of March 4th, 1697. On October 20th 1701, the master builder completed the new Neoclassical church, all built in masonry, with a Latin cruciform ground plan and a dome in the crossing, decorated with plaster sculptures, a choir and a rectangular tower on the frontispiece. The main altarpiece originally belonged to the convent of San Francisco and was moved here after the ecclesiastical confiscations in 1840. The stone engraved baptismal font is situated in the choir. The bell tower is 40 metres high. In the upper body there are six arches with six bells: two at the front and one on each



side. Above this, between pyramids, is a belfry with three openings on two levels.

#### Shrine of St. Nicholas

Today all that remains of this church is the Romanesque doorway, in good condition, which houses the old cemetery. The door is one of the most interesting Romanesque pieces in Ayllón. It is a major attraction for visitors. Its interior, in which funerals are no longer held, still bears a sense of mystery which seems to make time stand still. The walls are from the Romantic period. From this point, outside the town, the convent of San Francisco is just a walk away.

#### Shrine of St. Martin of the castle

Today, all that remains of this church is the majestic tower de La Martina and the stone foundations of a single-nave church with a circular apse. It can be reached by ascending the stone steps to the south-east of the castle mound, where it remains in all its splendour. Up until 1085, the town was located on this hill, where remains of buildings can be seen, as well as the 9th century castle which, according to our sources, was destroyed in 1295 in the fighting between kings and noblemen.

It is known that until the 16th century, the old castle tower, known as la Martina with a belfry with two openings decorated with finials, served as the bell tower of the church. It was also used a guard tower.

#### The Paredones

It is known that Ayllón was, at one point, under Moorish rule, proven by the wall known as Paredones which is still standing after centuries on the mound where the castle of Ayllón stood. As the surrounding land was occupied, earthenware pots and other objects corresponding to the first periods in history have been unearthed. Studies are being carried out to open the area to the public. Gothic chapel was built for the Marquises of Villena. In the interior is a Gothic tomb belonging to Álvaro Núñez de Daza. The apses and gardens have been restored. The building has been privately owned since the Seventies. Today, part of the church houses a museum, distinguished for its special interest in exhibiting Art Brut (outsider art). *Colección de Arte Brut. Templo Escolapio*

#### Shrine of St. John

Of this 13th century Romanesque church, the apse with three semicircular arches with three archivolts is still standing. In the 16th century a



#### CONVENTS AND OTHER BUILDINGS

#### Convent of St. Francis

At one kilometre from the town lie the ruins of this majestic convent, founded in 1214 by St. Francis of Asisi. The building was destroyed by fire and rebuilt between 1733 and 1738. Noteworthy is the masonry façade with a belfry and three semicircular arches. Although it is a private property and the inside may not be visited, it is a worthwhile stroll to admire the excellent stonework of the belfry in which the stone has been perfectly preserved. Today it is known as Los Claustros de Ayllón, and is a hotel speciali sing in events and conventions, a privileged spot for its beauty.

#### Convente of the Conceptionists

The church has a Greco-Roman (rectangular) ground plan and is in the Romanesque style with a vaulted ceiling in four rows. It has two choirs, one at the top and one below from which the modest Franciscan belfry rises. It passed into private hands in 2007 and today it is a hotel with its rooms being those occupied by nuns over five centuries.



#### **CIVIC BULDINGS**

#### Palace of the bishop Vellosillo

Its construction was ordered in the middle of the 16th century by the Bishop Vellosillo, bishop and gentleman of Lugo, who was born in this town. It was never occupied by the bishop, but by his nephew. The elegantly simple building, was privately owned until the Seventies, when it was acquired by the Town Hall as a public asset.

Today the building houses the library and the Museo de Arte Contemporáneo de Ayllón (Contemporary Art Museum of Ayllón) of great artistic and cultural richness, where works by such important artists as Barjola, Lucio Muñoz, Genovés, etc can be enjoyed. The Town Hall has created a virtual museum where all the museum's works can be viewed. www.ayllon.es/museo-virtual.





#### María Eugenia del Montijo

The first documented reference dates back to 1693 when it belonged to the Vellosillo family. After changing hands several times it later became the property of María de Sales, Portocarrero, Palafox, married to the Duke of Alba and older sister of the Empress Eugenia. It is well known that this palace was the where this distinguished lady would rest on her trips between Paris and Madrid.

#### Eagle house

This is another stately home built in stone masonry which takes its name from the spectacular coat of arms which rests on the façade, shaped like St. John's eagle. Calle DoctorTapia.

#### Hospital of Santi Espíritu


This old hospital was founded at the end of the I 6th century by the Sancti Spíritus brotherhood, where orphans were fed and raised and the sick taken care of. It served as both a hospital and a school. Today it houses the local retirement home. It can be found next to the bridge at the entrance to the town.

#### The tower house

It has a full history which has been documented since the the beginning of the 16th century and has belonged to the Chapter, the Téllez and Girón families, the Colegio de Lugo and the Counts of Puebla among others. It is the oldest civic building in Ayllón and was formerly a jail. It housed living quarters for the Civil Guard before it was later purchased by Caja Segovia, the local savings bank. It is located opposite the church of San Miguel.

#### Contreras's palace

This palace has been declared a National Monument and houses beautiful craft work and valuable objects. It dates back to the 16th century, but was restored in 1804 and destroyed by fire in 1945, from which only the façade survived, on which the coats of arms of the Marquises of Villena can still be seen.

# <u>A DIFFERENZ</u> Way To Enjoy Aylloni

The town of Ayllón has opted for a different and dynamic way to show the beauty and history of the town. The guided theatrical tours in Ayllón, show moments in the history of the town from the I 3th century to the present day. Figures such as his majesty Juan II of Castille, Friar Vicente Ferrer or Catherine of Lancaster tell of the historical events which unfolded in Ayllón. On the other hand, there are period scenes depicting everyday life. The tour, led by a guide, lasts approximately one hour and 45 minutes with six theatrical scenes.

# SUICUNON ROUTING

### The beech Forest of Tejera Negra

This has been a National Park since 1978. It belonged to the Comunidad de Villa y Tierra de Ayllón. This beech wood along with that in Pedrosa in Riofrío de Riaza are the most southerly in Europe and are hence of great importance.

#### Valvieja

It is believed to be one of the most fertile and hence the richest of these lands, also known for its roaming sheep. Noteworthy are the Castillian painted boards in the church and the public washing place which has recently been restored.

### Saldaña de Ayllón

In this village, half concealed by the Saldaña oak wood, is where, according to legend, the daughters of El Cid were abused by their husbands. The church of San Pedro holds a Byzantine-style image of the Holy Christ.

#### Santa María de Riaza

This church is located on a hill on the outskirts of the town and at the foot of the river Riaza. It is Romanesque with a single nave with a porticoed gallery on the side. This gallery



leads to its only door. The nave is covered by a Mudejar ceiling, possibly from the 15th century. The baptismal font is an artistic jewel, believed to be in the Visigothic style. It is a large granite piece which stands out for its cylindrical shape and its decoration.

#### Grado del Pico

This handsome Romanesque parish church is situated on the borders of the provinces of Soria and Guadalajara. The façade is thought to be from the 12th century. The square tower is suggestive of the period of splendour which Grado will have seen not so long ago The river Aguisejo, is sourced by the spring from which the church bears its name, Manadero de Grado. During the Peninsular War it was occupied by both sides at some point.

#### Santibáñez de Ayllón

This village is located in the deep and narrow valley near the borders of Soria and Guadalajara. It is noteworthy for its lush fertile plain irrigated by the river Aguisejo and streams which have their source in the area. The church is located in the higher part of the village and is dedicated to St. John the Baptist. It consists of a Baroque building and tower. The green of its lush fertile plain is a contrast to its black hills. Declared a picturesque village.





#### Estebanvela

Estebanvela and Francos are irrigated by the waters of the Aguisejo. They are famous for their walnuts and Reineta apples. In Estebanvela there is a shrine to the Padre Eterno (eternal father) beside the river Villacortilla, greatly worshipped in the area.

#### The la peña settlement of Estebanvela

This is situated some 800 metres from the village of the same name. It was discovered in 1992 and is the only known settlement from the Upper Paleolithic period in Segovia and one of the few places on the plateau of Castille-Leon with a complete chronology from this period.

Our ancestors, of the Magdalenian culture, lived in one of the caves from 14000 years ago to 11.000 years ago. They would go to the cave at the end of the summer and stay until the beginning of winter. During their stay they would make the most of the natural resources and minerals in the Aguisejo valley.

To the present day a significant collection of tools fashioned from stone and bone, jewellery etc. have been preserved. The most noteworthy of all is the collection of portable art (pieces of decorated slate), unique on the Iberian Peninsula.

#### A walking route along the river Aguisejo

#### Francos

Francos is known for its vegetable gardens on the fertile plain of the Aguisejo. Worth noting are the church and the stone spiral staircase.



#### Montejo de la Vega de la Serrezuela

It is situated on the left-hand margin of the river Riaza and, owing to its privileged and strategic setting, it was one of the most important bastions to populate during the period of the repopulation of this territory (11th century). Within the district, in a setting unique for its seclusion, close to the river Riaza and its canyon, the ruins of the Romanesque El Casuar shrine can be found (Historical Artistic Monument).


Close to the town is a reserve for birds of prey and carrion birds founded in 1975 by professor Félix Rodríguez de la Fuente, as well as several natural caves.

#### Maderuelo

Maderuelo is a historical complex from Medieval times. There are also remnants from the Roman era such as the Roman bridge, and the Romanesque period such as the shrine de la Vera Cruz (the true cross), the shrine of Nuestra Señora de Castroboda (Our Lady of Castroboda), the church of San Miguel, the inflow of the Linares reservoir and the old castle with a tower and archway leading to the walled town.

# LEC'S PARCY!

**THE CROSS IN AYLLÓN** is held on the first sunday in May in the belfry of the convent of San Francisco.

**THE ETERNAL FATHER** is 59 days after Easter Thursday and is held in the belfry of the ermita del Padre Eterno (shrine of the Eternal Father) in Estebanvela.

**ST. ISIDORE** is held on May 15th in all the local villages.

**ST. MICHAEL** patron of the town whose feast day is celebrated on September 29th.

**ST.AGATHA** is celebrated on February 5th in all the local villages.

LARDER THURSDAY is celebrated on the thursday before Ash Wednesday, in the incomparable setting of the local taverns, a walk which affords breathtaking views of the area.

MEDIEVAL FAIR is held over the last weekend in July. The medieval fair is organised by the Friends of the Middle Ages Association. There is a market, threshing, street theatre, falconry, storytelling, challenges, dinners for noblemen and plebeians, Celtic music etc...


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
